Universal screening is considered a first step in helping identify students in need of additional support. The goal is to find students who are failing or at-risk of failing to make adequate progress and are most commonly administered for reading and math. Screening should occur every year across the elementary grades. To allow early intervention, schools should screen early in the year so that they can allocate instructional resources intelligently. Students with scores below the screening cut-point should be directly assigned to Tier 2 (the direct route model) or targeted for progress monitoring (the PM model).

Universal Screener and Diagnostic Assessment. Universal screening assessments will be administered to all students at least three times during the year to provide an especially critical "first look" at individual students. Diagnostic assessments differ from screening measures. Screening measures are designed to be brief and efficient tools for quickly identifying who might be at risk. Diagnostic assessments are then used to confirm the initial screening results, and to inform intervention by

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determining a student's particular difficulties.

Ideally, all K-3 students should be screened three times per year starting in mid-kindergarten; diagnostic and progress monitoring assessments can be done as needed, with progress monitoring of children in an intervention being quite frequent to make sure that interventions are as effective as possible.

Elementary school systems implement diagnostic testing checkpoints into the academic curriculum throughout the school year. Some schools may conduct the tests quarterly while others conduct it at the halfway mark of the academic calendar. Elementary school subjects that warrant diagnostic testing are math and reading.

Universal screening is the systematic assessment of all students on academic and/or social-emotional indicators for the purpose of identifying students who are at-risk, and may require support that varies in terms of level, intensity, and duration.

Universal screening measures are brief assessments focused on targeted skills and are typically used with all children three times during a school year (fall, winter and spring) to measure progress and determine an appropriate level of support. Universal screening tools differ from other commonly used early childhood assessments.
