As a general rule, use the word "fewer" with count nouns (nouns that you can count, like "cups" and "pencils"). Use the word "less" with non-count nouns (nouns that you cannot count, like "water" and "courage"). So, for example, you would write, "There are fewer students attending the lecture this year than last year."
