In addition to works such as arrangements of operas and dances for string chamber groups, which were clearly designed with at-home use in mind, the early nineteenth century produced a wealth of chamber works that lacked obvious markers of their " lowbrow " social usefulness but apparently catered to a similar audience of recreational musicians—amateurs and professionals playing music for fun, presumably in private or semiprivate spaces.

The Social Worlds of Nineteenth-Century Chamber Music ...

In chamber music, several composers born in the 19th century carried the modified Late-Romantic style into the 20th. Among the French composers were Gabriel Faur é (1845 – 1924), who, with 10 works, is remembered primarily for a refined and controlled style that is rhythmically subtle; and Vincent d´ Indy (1851 – 1931), represented by about eight works, who reflected the style of C é sar Franck.

Consisting essentially of four dance forms that were then popular—the allemande, courante, sarabande, and gigue—the suites they composed were based on contrasting tempos, metres, and rhythmic patterns. The French version of the dance suites became the prototype for later chamber-music forms.

The middle of the 19th century saw more changes in society and in musical tastes, which had their impact on chamber music composition and performance. While improvements in instruments led to more public performances of chamber music, it remained very much a type of music to be played as much as performed.

The improved pianoforte was immediately adopted by Mozart and other composers, who began composing chamber ensembles with the piano playing a leading role. The piano was to become more and more dominant through the 19th century, so much so that many composers, such as Franz Liszt and Fr é ric Chopin, wrote almost exclusively for solo piano.
