Women at this level of society are usually considered to have had considerable gender equality, (though some scholars have argued that they had fundamentally the same subordinate status as women elsewhere in medieval society) but this often meant shared poverty.

Medieval society was essentially governed by patriarchy and women were subjected to male control regardless of their social class. In fact, the life of a peasant woman was enveloped by prohibition and general limitation imposed by the opposite sex. Women had to submit first to their father or to the male breadwinner of the house.

Geoffrey Chaucer's *Canterbury Tales* give an illuminating picture of many of the different people who made up medieval society, although these portraits are limited mainly to the middle classes. The Wife of Bath is one particularly vibrant character within the *Tales* and a few years later a real-world equivalent, Margery Kempe, showed in her autobiography that women had an important part in medieval society.
